

All initiatives for open source software development that make it easier for developers to use and reuse them have a place on the IDEE Platform portal.

All published resources must meet a series of obligatory requirements, such as:

• Licensing of open sources.

Open sources that are considered as such by the *Open Source Initiative* (OSI) are accepted, especially those regarded as being of greater use by this organization:

- Apache License 2.0 (Apache-2.0)
- 3-clause BSD license (BSD-3-Clause)
- 2-clause BSD license (BSD-2-Clause)
- GNU General Public License (GPL)
- o GNU Lesser General Public License (LGPL)
- MIT license (MIT)
- Mozilla Public License 2.0 (MPL-2.0)
- Common Development and Distribution License 1.0 (CDDL-1.0)
- Eclipse Public License 2.0 (EPL-2.0)
- o EUPL v 1.2
- Although the previous are recommended, the use of any of the licenses recognised by the OSI is acceptable and implies that the definition of open source given by this organisation is met. https://opensource.org/docs/osd
- The initiative must be documented in such a way that permits the development to be used and spread.
- It must be implemented, and examples and cases of use must be described.
- The person, group, or organisation promoting the initiative must be identified.
- The source code must be published and accessible through GitHub or a similar platform.
- It promotes and uses ISO and OGC standards, when their use is possible, in the solution developed.
- It must not use libraries (own or third-party) if they do not meet any of the requirements in this document, especially those referring to licensing and publication of the source code.
